

Remembering Bob Knudson from his wife Sybil, and children Ann, Carol and Dick

Bob Knudson spent 63 of his 89 years in the Haller Lake Neighborhood. He was born in Seattle and attended Bryant Grade School, Roosevelt High School and the University of Washington. He enlisted in the navy while still in high school but WWII was over by the time he got out of boot camp. He did get a lovely tour of the South Pacific picking up marines and soldiers from the Pacific Islands. He graduated from the UW in 1949 and met his wife Sybil in 1950. They were married in 1952. His family moved to the Haller Lake Neighborhood in 1954. Phyllis Brown had insisted that he and Sybil look at their current home and it was love at first sight! Both Bob and Sybil were active in the Haller Lake Community. They celebrated sixty years of marriage at the Haller Lake Community Club in 2012.

There will be a memorial service for Bob at the University Unitarian Church on Saturday, February 11, from 3 to 5pm. The church is located at 6556 35th NE. Seattle



HALLER LAKE CRIME REPORT JAN 2017

A number of residential burglaries have occurred in the neighborhood this month.

On Jan 25th a forced burglary took place at 143rd & Meridian and on Jan 24th at 1300 block of N 122nd.

On Jan 11th at the 1500 block of NE Brockman Pl a bedroom window was smashed with a rock and belongings were scattered, jewelry boxes were searched. Nothing appeared to be taken. Fingerprints were lifted from the jewelry boxes.

Jan 10th: 1100 block N 115th, a window screen was cut near the front door. A small pry bar was found nearby. \$300 in loose change, a laptop and a spare key to a Lexus was taken. Also on Jan 10th at the 1200 block NE 130th, a window was broken in a basement bedroom. \$3000 cash was stolen as well as a PS4 & 5 controllers. A large TV was unplugged but left behind.

Jan 7th: 140th & Wallingford a burglary was reported that took place between Jan 2 & 7th. A rear exterior kitchen door was kicked in. The residence is unoccupied and used for storage. A U-Haul truck was parked at the location for a day. The next day, a female driving the truck became stuck in a ditch near the house and told a neighbor that a tow truck was coming. The neighbor didn't believe the story and called 911. \$800 worth of property was taken.

Jan 4th: 140th & Burke a kitchen window was broken and all rooms were ransacked. There was also damage to a door and another window was broken. It was unknown what was missing.

Jan 1st: 137th & Midvale. A non-forced burglary took place at an apartment while the victim was away. His parents had been checking on it. The apartment was in disarray. The only way into the area is thru the apartment staff. Apparently a neighbor knew of the property inside. \$8171 worth of belongings were stolen. The victim thought this might be related to a stolen vehicle in December.

Vehicle thefts occurred on Jan 27th at 12000 block 2nd NE, Jan 22nd at N 115th & Corliss, Jan 16th at the 11200 block 3rd NE, Jan 10th at 1500 block N 115th, Jan 4th at 105th & Meridian and 10500 block Midvale, Jan 3rd at the 11000 block 2nd NE, Jan 1st at the 2200 block N 106th & Dec 28th at 137th & Midvale.

A license plate was reported stolen on Jan 20th at the 13700 block of Midvale and mail theft at 137th & 4th NE on Jan 10th.
